#### Dear Colleagues,

There are a multitude of ways that you can get involved, including joining the team of VTA representatives in your school: staff committee, Pro D committee, OHS committee, Social Justice rep and Staff rep. The work that we do is in response to the concerns of our members and our colleagues, and each person's contribution makes a difference.



#### WENDY CLARK


Wendy Clark began her teaching career with Sd#22 in 2007 and has remained at Ellison the entire time.



Wow! Where did the last 28 years go? It's hard to believe that I am now moving on to the next adventure in my life!


