New dental benefits kick in July 1

As part of our most recent collective agreement, the Federation successfully achieved improvements to several aspects of our extended health and dental benefits. On July 1, 2015, all local dental plans will see the per-person coverage for Orthodontics (Plan C) increased to 75%, with the per-person lifetime maximum rising to \$5,000. There will be no changes for local dental plans that already include or exceed these coverage and limits.

In addition, while members have been able to access dual coverage for the provincial standardized Pacific Blue Cross Extended Health Benefits plan since inception of the plan, beginning July 1, 2015, dual coverage for local dental plans will also be allowed for partners who a r e b o t h B C T F m e m b e r s .

For information about additional benefit improvements that will come into effect in 2017 and 2018, members can access two documents-Improvements in benefits and Questions and answers about the benefits improvements inside the MyBCTF portal.




